SECTION 4: FIRST AID MEASURES.

Eve contact.

4.2 Most important symptoms and effects, both acute and delayed.

<u>Special risks.</u>

5.3 Advice for firefighters.

SECTION 7: HANDLING AND STORAGE.

7.1 Precautions for safe handling.

The fumes are heavier than air and can spread across the ground. They can form explosive mixtures with air. Prevent the creation of flammable or explosive fume concentrations in the air; prevent fume concentrations above work exposure limits. The product must only be used in areas where all unprotected flames and other ignition points have been eliminated. Electrical equipment has to be protected according to applicable standards.


